I started Lent in January. 'Might as well get an early start. Honestly, I have resolved to adopt different ways of being this year. Some of my resolutions have to do with my diet and physical wellness. Other resolutions are more spiritual and vocational in nature. Each of them, individually and in concert with one another have to do with making progressive and healthy changes in body, mind, and soul. In other words, I am striving to repent. A priestly friend and colleague introduced me a few years ago to <u>David Whyte's work</u>. Whyte is a poet



and speaker whose thoughts and words provoke thousands of other fans to view life through the lens of their day to day experience in this world. Whyte's wisdom considers lessons of ancestry and

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spirituality. Some years ago, David offered a presentation at Seattle University's School of Theology. In this talk he offers this wonderful definition of repentance (metanoia – in New Testament Greek). David Whyte said (beginning at (9':55" in the video):

"There is a lovely etymology (meaning) to the word repent in the Bible because in the Greek the word repent was actually metanoia which simply meant not to go over your past sins and lash yourself on the back ... which you can do and enjoy if you like. Make yourself a very nice cup of coffee before you do it. But metanoia literally just to change your mind and to think differently." (Whyte, 2012)

The way that we think shapes the way that we speak. How we speak shapes the way that we live. Early Christians came to be known as people or followers of The Way. (Wiener, 2017). They claimed and received this title because they adopted powerfully their Christian disciplines and exhibited their Christian faith. Fasting, devotional prayers, silence, and acts of generosity were evidence of these newly baptized Christians' changes in heart, mind, and body.

Lent remains about resolutely changing who we are. It is an intentional season of transformation. We go with Jesus into the Wilderness We follow him into Jerusalem to confront persecutions and prejudices. We witness the intimate and vulnerable time he shares with his disciples. Lent beckons us to confront our own internal and external temptations. Such repentance invites us to reject cravings separating us from God's love and our neighbors' needs and desires. Once again, Lenten repentance gives us space to choose what ways we will think, speak, and walk upon moment by moment.

You'll observe in this Cornerstone many options for practicing your faith this Lenten season. You may decide to spend time contemplating the Stations of The Cross. Centering Prayer continues. Parish ministries such as the Diaper Bank always need volunteers. You may further elect to fast from a habit or ritual that focuses your life more on yourself than God. You should find time on a daily basis to pray and interact with Christ. <a href="Sacred Space">Sacred Space</a> offers a daily examination from the Jesuit tradition. Sign up for <a href="Richard Rohr's Daily Mediations">Richard Rohr's Daily Mediations</a>. There will be lots of additional options to choose from on the Internet.

We may enter Lent wholeheartedly. Such personal devotion, reflection, and thinking requires courage. Our Christian faith is sacramental and sacrificial. This holy work wholly offers pathways to join Jesus at the foot of the Cross as well as at the opening of Easter's empty tomb. May our pilgrimages through Lent's wilderness and wild places draw us nearer to God, provide awareness of God's angels, and offer us more trust in Jesus our Lord and Christ. May we claim our truest, very best Christian inheritance. Let us carry our divinely offered gifts with humility.

# Bishop Scanlan's Blog

Here is an excerpt from her January 26 post.

It took us a long time to find just the right house when we moved to Central Pennsylvania. Our poor realtor (the most patient man on earth) took me through at least 30 houses over a four or five-month period in no fewer than eight different towns and in all sorts of different neighborhoods. I'd given him a list of "essentials" that we had to have (a good kitchen space, room for two offices and a guest room, off-street parking, room for a cat to roam outside, a good basement and a dry lot) but it was amazing how many styles of homes fit the bill. We looked at colonials, contemporaries, saltboxes, split levels and ranches. We ended up in a wonderful post and beam house with all-wood interior (it has a cabiny feel to it) with two fireplaces, a sunroom and a deck. We knew as soon as we walked through the front door that we were home. But here's the best part: there's an acre of woods in the back.

The house is in a residential neighborhood a couple of miles outside of Mechanicsburg village. We have neighbors on our right and left, and across the street- it's a development built in the 1980s. But... while all of our neighbors have groomed lawns behind their houses, ours is a big patch of woods. Wilderness. Or at least, "Suburban Wilderness."

I've been working at my practice of meditation/centering prayer lately. In a life that is filled with appointments, meetings, books to read, sermons to write, emails to send and numerous conversations, the volume of words, thoughts and ideas can be very rich. Some weeks, it feels like eating a literary hot fudge sundae for breakfast, lunch and dinner every day. Words. Ideas. The Word of God. In order to address this, instead of filling my prayer time with more words, I've been working on finding quiet: seeking stillness of heart, body and soul, and just sitting. Sitting with God and being present. It's a practice that takes discipline and is harder than you might think. It is a bit like entering the wilderness- the wilderness of not knowing, of vulnerability, and of possibility. With all of the chatter in our lives (even when it's good chatter) it can be hard to slow down, settle down, and just "be."

#### Columbarium

There had been vestry discussion as to the desire/need for a Columbarium. These discussions have been with the vestry for approx. the past 2 years. In order to come to a final resolution (at this point

in time) Dave Peterson surveyed the congregation as to their need and interest in a Columbarium. The results are as follows:

We had 14 responses, 5 in favor, and 9 not in favor. Of the 5 who were in favor: One no longer attends our church, they just think it's a good idea. One was in favor, but would not be using ours, One was in favor but would not be using it. That left two in favor, who since then withdrew their response.

Dave Peterson moves that in light of this information, that the vestry will table further Columbarium discussions until next fiscal year. Jason Clapp seconds. Ken Altenbach amends motion to table further Columbarium discussions until there is more congregational interest in resuming conversations.

6 in favor, 1 abstention, Motion Passed.

George Reabuck makes motion that CMEC should join and participate in this Consortium. Jason Clapp second,

#### All in favor.

A conference will be held in Texas on February 21-24. We will be sending representatives to attend that conference.

Beverly Peterson reviews finalized budget.

Becky Sutherland makes motion to accept budget of \$269,271 with a surplus of \$6,644 including the Diocese Fair Share of \$30,533. Second by Dave Peterson. All in favor, 2018 budget approved.


Vestry also had a conversation about how much money should remain available in our working checking account.
